Good morning everyone,

Happy Easter to you all. Christ has risen just as he said he would!

Its Easter Sunday 2021, we have all made it to this point through a year of uncertainty and difficulty. There has been so much negativity in this past year but this morning I want to start by getting you to think about some of the things that you have enjoyed about this past year. So let me ask you a question – What are some of the things that you have been excited about this past year? Take a moment to think about this now. You might want to write them down or even type them in the notes in your phone or tablet.

Here are some of the things that I have been excited about this past year:

- 1. Getting to spend more time with my daughter and getting the unusual opportunity to see her develop in ways I wouldn't have if life was in its normal form.
- 2. Getting to enjoy the area that I stay in and walking many routes and visiting many parks that I wouldn't normally have had the time to.
- 3. Being able to have the time with my wife to sit and enjoy our favourite shows or films on, Netflix, Amazon Prime or Disney plus.



4. And lastly witnessing some footballing history throughout the past year, one of which was Scotland finally qualifying for a major championships for the first time in 22 years!

Wow! What a year it's been with so many ups and downs but one thing we can be sure of is that no matter how our lives change we have a God who never changes. Hebrews 13:8 – says that – 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever' and because of this we can be sure he will be with us in every situation that we face and his promises to us are a firm foundation to build our lives on. In Matthew 28:5-6 The woman who were first to visit the tomb were greeted by an angel who said 'Don't be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. Sermon -- The Right Reverend Dr Martin Fair, Moderator of the General Assembly

I wonder if you know the panel show "Would I lie to you"? It's one of our family favourites, and we never watch it without laughing out loud most of the way through the programme. The two team captains, David Mitchell and Lee Mack, they are so quick witted and the repartee fires back between one and the other. If you don't know the show the concept is very simple, there are two teams and each contestant takes it in turn to relay a situation or a scenario and the other team needs to work out is it true or are they telling a lie.

Well, let me give you an example as if it were me on the show. I would say something like this. "When I was 15 years of age I once went to school in my bare feet" and they would say



"well why would you do that?" I might respond "well the dog ate my shoes" and they would say "did you not have any other shoes?" And I would say "well actually I was in a hurray I was late for school and I didn't want to be late and I couldn't find my shoes so I just went straight to school" and back and forward it would go and then they would be asked so do you think he was telling the truth or telling a lie? That's the concept of the show and it's great fun.

Well, let me say this on this day of all days the big question is have we been lied to? Are we being lied to? Have all generations before us been lied to about the claims of Easter? That Jesus who died rose again on the third day. Have we been fooled? Have they pulled wool over our eyes? Have we been deluded in believing that? Well that's what I want to think about today.

Of course, the cynics would say that that's exactly what's happened. That we have been deluded and we have fooled ourselves all these years imagining, telling ourselves that Jesus rose from the dead. You see they would suggest that it's really not much more than wishful thinking. It's people who can't handle the idea of nothingness, of meaninglessness. It's people who struggle to believe that there is just nothing more and that they can't face the death of loved ones or their own mortality and so we have invented for ourselves the notion that Jesus rose and so that we might too live on after death.

Have we been lied to? Can we believe it?

But hold on a minute, just because we long for something doesn't necessarily mean that we've invented it in our minds, doesn't necessarily mean that it's a part of our imagination. We needn't dismiss things as quickly as all that. Take, for example from the physical realm, we might find ourselves hungry and thirsty and longing to satisfy these desires and do you know what? There is food. There is drink. We can satisfy these desires. Not something that we have just invented. There is a reality to it. Or in the emotional world, we might find ourselves longing to be loved. Well who's to say that's just an invention? Actually, there is love, we know that to be true from our experience. So, in the same way, just because we might long for life to be more than simply the three score years and ten that we spend in this earthly realm doesn't mean necessarily that we've invented the concept of life beyond death. Doesn't mean that we are building on the illusion that Jesus rose again. Who's to say that there's not truth in it?

What else have we got in our favour? In terms of believing that it's true that Jesus rose from the dead. Well of course the gospels and the writings of Paul in the New Testament affirm that many witnessed Jesus, that he was alive and of course the first of those witnesses were women. Each of the gospels affirms as much. Now that's important in itself. If you were making the story up, you would not have made women to be the first



witnesses. The witness of a woman was not thought to be credible in these days. It would be a wee bit like me, let's say having to go to court, maybe I had got myself in trouble of one kind or another and having to get a character reference from someone. Well listen, I know some disreputable people, people with a long criminal record people with all kinds of cases against them of fraud and deception and such like. That's not the kind of person I would be asking to give a character reference to me. Their testimony would be worthless. In the same way if you had been making the story up that Jesus was alive you would not have made the first witnesses to be women and then of course not just them but the disciples afterwards and over five hundred others who saw Jesus to be alive. Now one or two people you might say had been deluded or even had hallucinated but not that number.

The next thing is this, we know that those disciples were fearful for their lives and that after the death of Jesus, before knowing he was alive that they were huddled together behind locked doors. Yes, fearful for their lives. So how do you explain that they went from that position of cowering themselves in private to being out on the streets of Jerusalem proclaiming that Jesus was alive? How else other than that they had seen it and knew it to be true for themselves. You see the thing is those disciples and those who were around them, within a short few years afterwards were being persecuted on account of their beliefs.

Now, if you knew that it was all made up, that it was all a lie, don't you think you would come clean at the point your life was under threat? I know for myself I'd put my hand up at that point and say "I admit it. We made it up." And yet those men went to their deaths. And here we are two thousand years later and over the whole earth over two billion people believing that Jesus rose from the dead. That life beyond the grave is there and is open to us. Truth stays put. If it's made up, if it's a lie eventually it will be found out. Folks will see through it. Here's truth that has stayed put through all those years. We've got every reason to be confident.

Well, lies may travel more quickly but truth stays put longer and truth can't be suppressed or squashed or done away with. Truth remains. If you go to the history books and to the early days of the Soviet Union, they were determined to do away with religious belief and so believers were harassed, property was confiscated and so on. The USSR became the first state in the world to have as part of its ideological aims state atheism. No more religious faith. And yet of course the Soviet Union came and went but truth remains, and the church continues. And we see the same thing in China and in so many other places. You can't get rid of truth even though it be inconvenient.

You know I have every confidence in these truths that Jesus rose from the dead. From the scriptures, from what has happened through the years and equally so from what I have seen for myself. I wonder if some of you knew the wonderful and much missed May



Nicholson? Gosh May's life was a mess in every possible sense. She was lost in a hopeless world of addiction and hopelessness and then one evening in her despair found herself in a church and encountering Jesus Christ for herself and from that moment her life was turned around and transformed from the inside out. She spent the rest of her life proclaiming the truth of Christ risen. You see, changed lives matter and changed lives can't be explained away by will power. You know, May had tried so many times to sort her own life out without success.

Some of you may know that my own congregation in Arbroath has, for many years now been involved with those who are struggling with addiction and all other kinds of problems and I have seen for myself what happens when there is an encounter with the risen Christ. Now, that can't be achieved by made up stories. Only by the presence of Christ himself, and we've seen many now through the years. Men and women alike who have been freed form the chaos of addictions, from the prisons cells that they were in, to freedom and to life in all its fullness. Jesus is with us even now.

Friends, might we have confidence, might we believe our historic faith, because if Jesus is not raised then our faith is useless and we of all people are most to be pitied. Let us instead be confident that he who died rose again and is with us even now. This is the Easter Good News.
